Register Now: CHAMPS 2024 Next Level Skills Training

Registration is now open for the <u>CHAMPS 2024 Beyond CORE</u> <u>Competencies: Next Level Skills for Health Center Supervisors and</u> <u>Managers</u> training (Next Level Skills). This six-week virtual program will be facilitated by Lisa Mouscher, CEO and Lead Consultant at Sogence Training and Consulting, and is designed to foster a highly interactive learning experience with a dynamic, hands-on approach. Sessions will cover a variety of topics, allowing attendees to dive deeper into the best practices, knowledge, and skills needed to be a great manager. This training is intended for managers and supervisors with a minimum of 18 months of supervisory experience or as a follow-up for those who have attended the CHAMPS Core Competencies for Health Center Supervisors and Managers training.

The course will take place over six Wednesday mornings from April 24-May 29, 2024, meeting from 9:00-11:30 AM MT / 10:00 AM-12:30 PM CT; the first meeting on April 24 will last 30 minutes longer, until 12:00



PM MT / 1:00 PM CT. Registration will close on Monday, March 25, 2024, or when the course is full. A limited number of registration scholarships are still available for participants from Utah and Wyoming.

NIMAA Awarded PBHE Grant to Boost Clinical Training in Colorado

• the national institute for <u>National Institute for Medical Assistant Advancement</u> (NIMAA) recently received a Practice-Based Health Education (PBHE) grant through the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE). Executed in October 2023, the two-year grant will allow NIMAA to increase clinical, practice-based training opportunities for those looking for a healthcare career as a Medical Assistant in the state of Colorado.

Over the next two years, NIMAA will identify new and existing clinical sites to partner with and expand the placement locations available to students. Through the use of the Readiness to Train Assessment Tool (RTAT), NIMAA will incorporate evaluation into its grant and examine the effectiveness of its program through assessments administered prior and after expansion efforts. NIMAA will strategically enhance the visibility of its educational training program and clinical partners through marketing and communications efforts funded through the PBHE grant.

NIMAA will also develop two training courses for clinical partner preceptors through the PBHE grant. The first will focus on Preceptor Effectiveness and Wellness, with an emphasis on ensuring that preceptors have the skills, knowledge, and abilities to be confident and effective in their roles. The second will emphasize the principles and importance of Justice, Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (JEDI) in the role of a preceptor.

Through grants like the PBHE, NIMAA is able to continue to serve students, expand clinical site partnerships, and provide affordable, accessible healthcare training to those seeking healthcare careers.

Coming Soon: Region VIII PCMH Virtual Training

With support from the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), the National Committee for Quality Assurance (NCQA) is offering a virtual training focused on Patient-Centered Medical Home (PCMH) Recognition tailored for health centers in Region VIII. This training event, hosted by the Montana Primary Care Association (MPCA), will consist of two courses: NCOA's Introduction to PCMH Program: Foundational Concepts of the Medical Home and NCQA's Advanced PCMH Program: Mastering the Medical Home Transformation.

Register Now: CHAMPS 2024 Spanish Language Trainings

Registration is now open for the <u>CHAMPS 2024 Spanish Language for Healthcare Providers</u> trainings. Four different Spanish language courses will be offered in partnership with Rìos Associates. Trainings will be held virtually from 8:00 AM-12:00 PM MT / 9:00 AM-1:00 PM CT each day with optional tutoring offered in the afternoon. The traditional <u>Medical Spanish Language Course for Beginner and Intermediate</u> <u>Speakers</u> will be held over four half-days: Thursday, April 11; Friday, April 12; Thursday, April 18; and Friday, April 19, 2024.

CHAMPS will also host three courses that will be held over two-half-days each:

- ★ <u>Spanish Language for Oral Health Providers</u> is intended for dentists, dental hygienists, and other clinical dental personnel with beginner Spanish language skills. This session will occur Monday, April 8 and Tuesday, April 9, 2024.
- ★ Spanish Language for Behavioral Health Providers is designed for psychologists, psychiatrists, mental health counselors, social workers, addiction counselors, and other behavioral health personnel with intermediate to advanced Spanish language skills. This course will take place on Monday, April 15 and Tuesday, April 16, 2024.
- ★ <u>Medical Spanish Language for Advanced Spanish Speakers</u> is targeted towards physicians, physician assistants, nurse practitioners, and other clinical personnel with advanced Spanish language skills. Sessions for this course will occur on Monday, April 22 and Tuesday, April 23, 2024.

Medical-Dental Integration Possibilities with RoMoNOH

What is medical-dental integration? According to the <u>Rocky Mountain</u> <u>Network of Oral Health</u> (RoMoNOH) Project, there are numerous models of medical-dental integration (MDI) because "one size does not fit all." All models aim to "bring the mouth back into the body" and increase medical and dental providers' awareness of the oralsystemic health relationship. RoMoNOH is funded by the HRSA

<u>Maternal and Child Health Bureau</u> and is one of three regional projects that are part of the <u>Networks for</u> <u>Oral Health Integration</u>. All three projects aim to reduce dental decay and promote oral health equity.

Over the last four years, the RoMoNOH Project and State Primary Care Association (SPCA) practice transformation coaches in <u>Montana</u>, <u>Wyoming</u>, <u>Colorado</u>, and <u>Arizona</u> have been working with community health centers in their states to determine what MDI model is the best fit and help them implement it. All models focus on providing preventive oral health services at the medical visits of young children including caries risk assessment, fluoride varnish application, dental referral coordination, oral health anticipatory guidance, and oral health goal setting. Three MDI models are being implemented including oral health services provided by a medical provider (or delegated team member), a dental hygienist embedded into the medical team, or a hybrid of both. Characteristics impacting which MDI model the health centers chose include clinic size, location, capacity of co-located services, access to outside dental services, reimbursement, dental hygienist scope of practice, and leader/provider preferences.

Over time, an oral health environmental policy scan of each participating state paved the way for changes and new MDI model opportunities. For example, as of 2021, Wyoming medical and dental encounters can now be reimbursed on the same day, broadening the MDI models that are possible. The RoMoNOH Project hopes to raise awareness about the various medical-dental integration models and the potential of change through policy work, while also encouraging health centers to take an initial step to promote oral health for patients.

Open Enrollment Closes with Historic Participation Numbers

On January 24, 2024 the Biden-Harris Administration announced 21.3 million people selected an <u>Affordable Care Act</u> (ACA) Health Insurance Marketplace plan during the landmark 2024 Open Enrollment Period. A breakdown of this number reveals five million new enrollees and 16 million people who renewed their coverage. This year, the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) enabled four in five <u>HealthCare.gov</u> customers to find health care coverage for \$10 or less per month for plan year 2024 after subsidies. The uninsured rate is at a historic low of 7.9% according to the most recent whole-year survey data from the Current Population Survey, which covers through the end of plan year 2022. Additionally, the administration issued almost \$100 million in Navigator Awards, allowing organizations to hire staff trained to help consumers find affordable, comprehensive health coverage.

In the upcoming months, the <u>National Center for Equitable Care for Elders</u> (NCECE) is set to host two virtual events focused on older adult health. The first event, a webinar titled *Navigating Polypharmacy Management in Older Adults*, will take place Tuesday, March 19, 2024, meeting from 12:00-1:00 PM MT / 1:00-2:00 PM CT. This webinar will focus on optimizing medication plans for community-dwelling older adults, particularly those living with multiple chronic conditions. Participants will review person-centered approaches for shared decision-making in the deprescribing process.

NCECE will also be hosting a virtual learning collaborative titled *Leveraging Local Strengths to Improve Older Adult Health & Well-Being.* Sessions will take place over four Tuesday afternoons from April 2-May 14, 2024, meeting from 12:00-1:00 PM MT / 1:00-2:00 PM CT each week. The content of this learning collaborative will highlight the value of partnerships with aging services network agencies to address the support needs of community-dwelling older adults. Utah Navajo Health System Awarded HHS Funding for New Satellite Facility

In January, the <u>U.S. Department of Health and Human Services</u> (HHS), through the <u>Indian Health Service</u> (IHS), awarded \$55 million in funding to 15 tribes and tribal organizations as part of the competitive <u>Small Ambulatory Program</u>; this IHS program focuses on investing in the construction, expansion, or modernization of small ambulatory health care facilities. Of the 15 recipients of this year's award, the list included one Region VIII health center. <u>Utah Navajo Health System</u> (UNHS) was awarded \$3.85 million to be used for construction of a new satellite facility. UNHS currently operates four clinics throughout southeastern Utah. Since its creation in 2001, the Small Ambulatory Program has funded more than 79 projects, totaling more than \$178 million. Ninety five percent of tribally operated health care facilities provide primarily ambulatory services. Ambulatory care facilities managed by tribes and tribal organizations offer increased access to culturally appropriate, quality care.

Updated Federal Poverty Guidelines

On January 17, 2024, the <u>U.S. Department of Health and Human Services</u> (HHS) announced the annual update to the <u>HHS Poverty Guidelines</u>. The Office of the Assistant Secretary for Planning and Evaluation (ASPE) has also released an article summarizing the <u>HHS Poverty Guidelines for 2024</u>.

HRSA Launches New Maternal Health Initiative

On January 25, 2024, <u>Health Resources and Services Administration</u> (HRSA) Administrator Carole Johnson and U.S. Representative Lauren Underwood, co-chair of the Black Maternal Health Caucus, launched the year-long *Enhancing Maternal Health Initiative*. The initiative aims to enhance, expand, and expedite HRSA's maternal health work, tackling maternal mortality and health disparities through collaboration with mothers, grantees, community organizations, as well as state and local officials nationwide. The initiative will focus its efforts in 11 states, including one Region VIII state (MT), and the District of Columbia, as these areas have been identified as high-need locations with significant opportunities for new partnerships and collaborations. Throughout the next year, HRSA will be bringing grantees from across the states of focus together to foster collaboration and drive progress towards ending the maternal mortality crisis.

HRSA & HUD Regional Offices Partnering to Address the Availability of Housing for Health Care Professionals

The availability of housing for health care professionals has been a persistent problem in rural areas, and increasingly in metro areas since the COVID-19 pandemic. In mid-December, the <u>Health Resources and</u> <u>Services Administration</u> (HRSA) and <u>U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development</u> (HUD) Region VIII Offices partnered to convene two roundtables in South Dakota to introduce HUD's housing-affiliated organizations in the state to key health care organizations, including hospital/clinic systems, the Hospital Association, the <u>State Primary Care Association</u>, health centers, the <u>State Office of Rural Health</u>, and the <u>South Dakota Area Health Education Center</u>, and have an initial discussion about potential solutions.

Health care organizations attending the roundtables gained an understanding of the HUD-supported housing advocacy networks in South Dakota in terms of who to contact and the types of counseling assistance available to them. Some of the health care organizations committed to inviting the housing advocacy organizations to present at their annual conferences. HUD-certified housing counselors at one of the roundtables agreed to provide training to the local health system's HR department to enable them to help health care professionals they recruit navigate their housing assistance options. The HRSA/HUD partnership continues with recent discussions taking place regarding the prospect of additional roundtables in the other five states in the region.

Food and Mood Action Points for Health Care Providers

Focused on enhancing emotional well-being in K-12 school environments, the <u>Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services</u> <u>Administration's</u> (SAMHSA) <u>Food and Mood Project</u> works closely with regional partners to advance projects that address the intersection of behavioral health and nutrition. In 2023, the team

hosted its first annual summit titled *Creating Conversation, Building Connections, and Collaborations*. From this gathering, the team gained useful insights for health and behavioral healthcare providers who want to implement integrative care interventions for children and their families.

There are a range of actions providers can consider, including exploring state specific <u>Medicaid waivers</u> that address social needs such as housing, food, and education. Providers can also <u>screen for hunger</u> and make referrals to improve nutrition security for patients. Another option is to consider how <u>culture works</u> <u>as a protective factor</u> and integrate cultural approaches into the care process. Providers serving Medicaid patients with severe mental health or substance use disorder can explore the <u>Innovation in Behavioral Health Model</u>, which helps bridge the gap between behavioral and physical care. Lastly, developing patient centered one-pagers with easy-to-grasp Food and Mood concepts can be helpful for health education. These action points are part of an <u>expanded list</u> that interested providers can reference for more ideas related to Food and Mood.
